WHAT'S AHEAD IN THE LEGISLATURE

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. Rick Scott and Florida legislators will be in a giving mood when they start their annual 60-day lawmaking session Tuesday.

With an election in November and a projected \$1.3 billion budget surplus, Republican leaders in the House and Senate have laid out a pricey to-do list, from cutting taxes and fees to expanding school vouchers.

Lawmakers also will dive into some thorny social questions, such as whether to authorize “destination” casinos in South Florida.

Red-light cameras

Red-light cameras have been under fire since their legalization in 2010. A new study by the Legislature's policy analysis office found that local governments generated \$119 million from the cameras last year, and the intersections where they were installed had fewer deaths — but more accidents. That has both presiding officers of the House and Senate pledging new regulations.
