Reverend Gail Tapscott, 110 SW 8 Avenue, representing the Unitarian Universalist Church of Fort Lauderdale, expressed concern about the location of the proposed community center. She questioned whether this is a futile gesture that does not fully address the problem.

Jeff Weinberger, no address provided, spoke stating the shelter is desperately needed for the homeless in addition to affordable housing. Mr. Weinberger noted the Broward Sheriff's Stockade has a mandated use that does not fall in line with what the City is proposing.

Marshall Schnipper, 425 SW 4 Avenue, expressed concerns about the location of the Stockade being too far from the services for the homeless which are located six miles away in the downtown area.

Frank Pontillo spoke in opposition of this item and in support of the Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing (HEARTH) Act supported by HUD as an alternative to turning the Stockade into short-term housing for the homeless.

Charles King, 105 North Victoria Park Road, spoke in support of the item noting that the Stockade is located in an industrialized area away from neighborhoods.

There being no other individuals wishing to speak on this matter, a motion was made Commissioner Roberts to close the public hearing and was seconded by Vice-Mayor McKinzie.

Commissioner Trantalis as a member of the National Continuum of Care Board responded to some of the questions and points raised during the public hearing. He went on to say the Sheriff's Department has advocated the use of the Stockade. At a minimum, it puts a roof over someone's head and it is not intended as a housing solution for the homeless but is a temporary solution until a better option is identified. Additionally, moving homeless services nearer to this location is being considered as an option.

Commissioner Rogers explained that he and City Manager Feldman toured the Stockade site and described it for the audience noting that part of the facility could be used as a day facility to provide services for the homeless to get them back on their feet. He commented that the City has received push-back from the County Commission on this proposal which has been frustrating. Commissioner Rogers was supportive of this item and hoped for more collaboration on this issue from the County Commission.

Commissioner Roberts agreed with Commissioners Trantalis and Commissioner Rogers noting it is meant to be a temporary housing facility to provide services until the City can provide homeless people more permanent housing. Commissioner Roberts stated that currently there are no resources available to provide permanent housing immediately. He noted that many possible solutions such as Housing First needed to be a joint effort with both the City and the County.

Mayor Seiler stated it is frustrating to have opposition regarding something that is within City limits noting the fact that they are working with multiple partners to be the host community and also noting this facility is on a bus route. Mayor Seiler also stated that Commissioner Roberts volunteered to support this facility, which is within his district. Mayor Seiler went on to note the homeless issue is also a County responsibility and hopes that the County will step up and work with the City on this matter as they have funds provided to them for this purpose.

Further discussions ensued on this topic.

Charles King, 105 North Victoria Park Road, addressed the Commission questioning how the funds are to be paid.

Commissioner Trantalis commented he was uncomfortable with this resolution. City Manager Feldman stated the funds would be not paid up front. He explained what CBRE would be expected to do under this arrangement. City Manager Feldman said CBRE is going to APPROVED a Request For Proposals (RFP) comprehensive in scope to go out on the market. Commissioner Trantalis expressed his concerns with the delay from CBRE.

City Manager Feldman stated his staff is working with State staff to address numerous State related issues for this project. This is in addition to negotiations relating to the submerged land lease issue. Once all of these issues are resolved, the RFP would be reviewed for input by the Marine Advisory Board and the Beach Redevelopment Advisory Board. Once approved, CBRE would be responsible for the marketing of the project nationwide.

Commissioner Trantalis stated he was also concerned with the amount of compensation to be paid to CBRE for marketing this project nationally. Commissioner Roger said he did not see any other alternatives at this time noting the RFP needs to be written so as to attract the best developers possible from across the country.

City Auditor John Herbst gave his analysis of this deal as a result of his research regarding current trends in the real estate industry and his opinion as to the soundness of the deal.

City Attorney Everett advised she had concerns about the current proposed agreement with CBRE because the agreement is not specific about how and when these fees are to be paid. Ms. Everett stated the language in the agreement and the terms need to be clearer and more specific.

Scott Allen, Vice President of CBRE, spoke and said CBRE is willing to provide clearer language and terms and to clearly state that the developer would be paying the fee. City Attorney Everett stated she felt an agreement could be reached.

There were no other individuals wishing to speak. A motion was made by Commissioner Trantalis and seconded by Commissioner Roberts to close the public hearing.



Nearly half a million people lined Fort Lauderdale Beach and watched from hotel balconies, condo towers and rooftops on April 28, 2012 to see the return of South Florida's largest and most popular spectator event. The Lauderdale Air Show lit up the gray skies over Fort Lauderdale Beach and provided a spectacle of flight, sight and sound. America's Air Show returned and with it the mass crowds, economic impact and patriotic salute to the United States military.


# The unique challenge of the Air Show

- The stage for the show is 5 miles long and 500 feet above the ground
- 90% of the beach viewing area is outside the event site and free of charge
- 90% of the Police & Fire detail is outside the event site to support the same
- Most beach-goers do not come to Fort Lauderdale to attend the air show
- They visit Fort Lauderdale Beach because the air show is here
- The millions in economic impact they generate goes into the community







## Other General Issues and Suggestions:

- Enforce noise ordinances related to noise violations being produced by motorcycles.
- Review and develop solutions for the recurring traffic congestion on SE 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue between Las Olas and SE 2<sup>nd</sup> Street (both northbound and southbound) during the peak morning and evening rush hours.












# Other General Issues and Suggestions
