**TITLE:** Public Hearing - Resolution Adopting the Lauderdale Isles Water Management District's Fiscal Year 2023 Budget and Non-Ad Valorem Assessment of \$15 Per Parcel Abutting on the Canals - **(Commission District 4)**

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**Recommendation**

Staff recommends the City Commission conduct a public hearing and adopt a resolution approving the Lauderdale Isles Water Management District's Fiscal Year 2023 Budget and Annual Non-Ad Valorem Assessment of \$15 per parcel abutting on the canals for Fiscal Year 2023, beginning October 1, 2022, and ending September 30, 2023.

**Background**

The Lauderdale Isles Water Management District was created as an independent special district by the Broward County Commission in November 1970 for the purpose of protecting the water quality of the waterways in Lauderdale Isles. The District became a dependent district within the City of Fort Lauderdale when it was annexed in 2002. The primary duty of the District has been to provide aquatic weed control in canals. Additional duty areas being explored are in compliance with Broward County concerning water quality, permitting and construction of new and dilapidated docks, enforcement of the Florida Derelict Vessel Program, safe consumption of fish and blue crabs, proper canal depths, dredging to remove obstructions, canal dumping of lawn debris, nuisance alligators, waterway cleanup, safe navigation, and waterway safety.

The District is authorized to prepare and submit a tentative assessment rate and budget to the Fort Lauderdale City Commission, annually, for approval. The special assessment and budget must be established for the purposes of maintaining the canals and, as such, the District Board adopted a resolution determining that the District's expenses and cost of maintaining the canals should be specially assessed against all properties within the District abutting on the canals. The District advertised its intent to establish the non-ad valorem assessment and budget and approved its tentative budget at its March 21, 2022, District meeting.

The Lauderdale Isles Water Management District budget is \$120,405 which includes a special assessment of \$15 per parcel abutting on a canal within the District that generates \$8,265 plus a balance of \$112,140 from prior years.

The Chair of the local governing board, or his or her designee, is required per Section 197.3632(5)(a), Florida Statutes to certify the non-ad valorem assessment roll to the Broward County Tax Collector no later than September 12, 2022.

**Resource Impact**

There is no impact to the City's budget.
