## Problem Identification

Substance abuse is a pervasive problem among youth in the United States, with over 10 million youth engaging in alcohol and drug usage (SAMHSA, 2011). Heavy alcohol and drug dependence or abuse causes serious mental, physical and emotional damage and often results in numerous accidental deaths among youth per year (SAMSHA, 2013). In Broward County, alcohol, cigarettes, inhalants and marijuana are the drugs of choice for most middle school aged students. Approximately $28 \%$ of middle school aged students reported having used alcohol in a lifetime; $9.4 \%$ inhalants; $7.8 \%$ cigarettes, and $7.1 \%$ marijuana or hashish. (Florida Youth Substance Abuse Survey and Youth Risk Behavior Survey, 2012). Of all students surveyed across the State, almost half ( $47.3 \%$ ) have used alcohol in their lifetime. Among middle school, almost half ( $48.3 \%$ ) of females and $44.7 \%$ of males admit to using alcohol; $21.6 \%$ of females and $24.9 \%$ admit to using marijuana. Marijuana far outnumbered alcohol in the numbers of juvenile criminal drug charges and addiction treatment admissions for the most recent Broward County reporting periods. (Broward Briefings, Volume V Issue 6, January 2012).

A majority of the schools, neighborhoods and communities served by the Urban League are located in areas that are characterized by the highest number and percentage of youth at risk, incidence of child abuse and neglect, gang activity, substance abuse and overall referrals to the Juvenile Justice system. Forty percent ( $40 \%$ ) of the children in the urban pocket we serve live in poverty; $47 \%$ are single parent households; and $53 \%$ of the population receives public assistance (U.S. Census Bureau, 2012). According to the United Way of Broward County Commission on Substance Abuse S-Pat for Children and Youth (2013), the delayed onset of drug and alcohol use by youth will decrease the possibility of risky behavior and alcohol, tobacco and other drug (ATOD) usage in adulthood. Early intervention with risk factors (e.g., deviant attitudes and behaviors; poor self-control) often has a greater impact than later intervention by changing a child's life path (trajectory) away from problems and toward positive behaviors (National Institute on Drug Abuse, 2014). As serious lifelong consequences are linked to alcohol use by our children and youth, the proposed continuation of the Substance Abuse Prevention (SAP) program is designed to decrease risk factors and increase protective factors through the combination of activities that foster character building while teaching the importance of remaining drug free.

In an effort to change attitudes towards alcohol, tobacco and other drugs, the current year Substance Abuse Prevention (SAP) program has provided Botvin Life Skills to over 200 middle school youth. While all post testing has not been completed for the year, to date the program has produced the following outcomes: $74.1 \%$ of youth receiving a 7 to 9 week session of Botvin Life Skills curriculum have maintained or increased their disapproval of alcohol, tobacco and other drugs (ATOD); $76.2 \%$ of youth receiving a 7 to 9 week session of Botvin Life Skills curriculum have maintained or increased their ability to manage peer pressure associated with the use of ATOD; and, $71.4 \%$ have either improved their grades, reduced the number of suspensions and/or increased their

school attendance.
The Urban League currently provides Project SAP to 6th, 7th and 8th graders at William Dandy School, Sunrise, Lauderdale Lakes, and Deerfield Beach Middle Schools utilizing one Program Team Lead and dedicated Youth Contractors, during both in (primarily) and out of school time. Our involvement in the current schools has heightened our awareness of the need to continue life skills and prevention education, and more importantly, to offer services at an earlier age. Prevention education programs prove most effective when youth are old enough to understand necessary consequences of their choices, but before they have delved too deeply into negative activities such as the drug culture. According to UWBCCSA strategic prevention framework logic model-2010 FYSAS release 7,751 (or 14.8\%) of Broward County middle school students report current alcohol use. It is clear that education must begin before middle school if we intend to reduce the usage rate for youth.

The ULBC is very clear that the need for prevention education is paramount to successful student performance in and out of school. It is our desire to offer a continuum of services for students throughout the school day, as well as field trips and summer camp opportunities. The Evidence Based Botvin Life Skills curriculum used in the SAP program is designed to serve both elementary and middle school youth as a way to help students make good decisions and build confidence when faced with substance abuse or other risky situations. As a part of this application, ULBC has selected two elementary schools, Rock Island and Walker Elementary schools that feed into William Dandy and Sunrise Middle respectively as a way to offer services at a younger age but also to provide a continuum of care for youth and families. ULBC will continue to utilize and build upon the Hawkins and Catalano risk and protective factors social development model for all youth engaged in the SAP Program.

## Project Summary (Scope of Work)

SAP is an evidence-based, in and out of school, substance abuse prevention/education program. This program promotes healthy alternatives to risky behavior through life skills activities designed to equip a minimum of 125 elementary (ages 8-12) and middle (ages 12-15) school age youth with the necessary skills to resist negative behaviors, develop greater self-esteem, confidence and enable students to effectively make good decisions. The Urban League will serve both male and female youth who attend elementary/middle school in the City of Fort Lauderdale. By virtue of partnering school locations and demographics, the program will engage mostly African-American students, but is open to all students regardless of racial and ethnic background.

SAP participants will attain the following outcomes:
$80 \%$ of youth will increase their knowledge concerning the risk of ATOD usage.
$80 \%$ of youth will maintain or increase their disapproval or alcohol, tobacco and other drugs.
The ULBC proposes to serve elementary and middle school students, ages $8-15$, attending William Dandy Middle, Surrise Middle, Rock Island Elementary or Walker Elementary School. The selected schools are located in the 33311 and 33304 zip code areas. Both areas demonstrate high levels of poverty, crime and substance abuse issues. The target population is low to moderate income, racial and ethnic minorities, and foreign born populations. The SAP Program directly responds to the conditions that youth are exposed to in their neighborhoods by specifically addressing risk factors and increasing protective factors.

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While income is not a program eligibility requirement, the ULBC chooses to conduct services within Title 1 schools where a high number of students are on the free and/or reduced lunch program. The ULBC chooses these schools/students as we understand, through observation and data, that children eligible for such programs are increasingly exposed to risky behaviors and have the greatest need for life skills education. The ULBC will use the Hawkins and Catalano Social Development Framework to address the following risk factors: availability of alcohol and other drugs, community laws and norms favorable to drug usage and crime, lack of commitment to school, academic failure beginning in late elementary school, early and persistent anti-social behavior, friends who engage in problem behavior, and early initiation of problem behavior. The SAP Program will respond to such risks by creating bonding and attachment opportunities to school, opportunities for pro-social involvement, bonding to peers with healthy beliefs and clear standards, and increase social skills through the Botvin Life Skills curriculum and by working with engaged staff and contractors.

The ULBC will reach over 125 unduplicated youth during the program year with the intent to increase positive behaviors. Each school will identify youth participants, which traditionally has been done by classroom. Each participating school will integrate the SAP program as an elective or special class that is conducted during the school day.

SAP will provide the following services:
Substance Abuse Prevention Groups Sessions: Conducted by youth educators (contractors with a Bachelor's Degree, Teaching Certificate preferred) or ULBC staff with students during the school day utilizing the Botvin Life Skills Curriculum. Each cohort will meet twice a week for One hour sessions. Elementary school youth receive 8 sessions; 6 th $\& 7$ th grade youth, 18 sessions; and, 8thgrade youth, 12 sessions. The sessions will address substance abuse prevention by teaching life skills and drug refusal techniques, problem solving, self-esteem and other issues in areas that - improve protective factors for youth. Group sessions may also be conducted during ULBC's summer enrichment camp.

Youth Alternative Drug Free Events: Pro-social activities conducted in collaboration with the schools that are promotes as drug-free events. One 2 to 3 hour event for each of the 4 schools will be planned. School dances or parties will be conducted with the schools on early release days or during the school day. In addition, ULBC will work with selected students to engage them in at least 1 community wide ATOD event such as the 'Above the Influence' march.

Field Trips: 1 for middle school and 1 for elementary school students, each lasting about 3 hours, including visits to either a local treatment center and/or colleges to expose youth to the impact of good and poor decision making to support what has been taught in the classroom environment

Anti-Drug Presentations: one-hour presentations once a month for 10 months. ULBC staff will present one-time anti-drug presentations for youth participants in the City of Fort Lauderdale working with City parks, other schools and /or other Urban League programs.

Tracking: ULBC data integrity and research staff will track programmatic activities using excel and Efforts to Outcomes data system. In addition, they will analyze collected pre and post test data to determine programmatic impact.

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The Urban League of Broward County utilizes fidelity checklist to ensure proper implementation of the Botvin Life Skills curriculum. Checklists are available for all group sessions on both the elementary and middle school level. In addition to the checklist, Youth Educators (contractors) are responsible for completing group summary sessions. Both the fidelity checklists and group summaries are completed by the Youth Educator (contractor) at the conclusion of each module and submitted to the Data and Billing Integrity Coordinator for data entry at the beginning of each week. The ULBC's Research and Evaluation Manager reviews/analyzes both tools for quality assurance and fidelity purposes.

Records supporting each service provided will be kept to document reimbursement requests and progress towards outcome attainment. Quarterly Performance Reports and Outcome \& Financial Reports will be submitted.

## 20. Commencement of Project

a. If a project is not operational within 60 days of the original start date of the award period, the subgrant recipient must report by letter to the Department the steps taken to initiate the project, the reasons for delay, and the expected start date.
b. If a project is not operational within 90 days of the original start date of the award period, the subgrant recipient must submit a second statement to the Department explaining the implementation delay.
c. Upon receipt of the ninety (90) day letter, the Department shall determine if the reason for delay is justified or shall, at its discretion, unilaterally terminate this agreement and reobligate subgrant funds to other Department approved projects. The Department, where warranted by extenuating circumstances, may extend the starting date of the project past the ninety ( 90 ) day period, but only by formal written adjustment to this agreement.

## 21. Excusable Delays

a. Except with respect to defaults of consultants, the subgrant recipient shall not be in default by reason of any failure in performance of this agreement according to its terms (including any failure by the subgrant recipient to make progress in the execution of work hereunder which endangers such performance) if such failure arises out of causes beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of the subgrant recipient. Such causes include, but are not limited to, acts of God or of the public enemy, acts of the government in either its sovereign or contractual capacity, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, strikes, freight embargoes, and unusually severe weather, but in every case, the failure to perform shall be beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of the subgrant recipient.
b. If failure to perform is caused by failure of a consultant to perform or make progress, and if such failure arises out of causes beyond the control of subgrant recipient and consultant, and without fault or negligence of either of them, the subgrant recipient shall not be deemed in default, unless:
(1) Supplies or services to be furnished by the consultant were obtainable from other sources,
(2) The Department ordered the subgrant recipient in writing to procure such supplies or services from other sources, and
(3) The subgrant recipient failed to reasonably comply with such order.

## 22. Grant Adjustments

b. All employees in positions designated by law as positions of trust or responsibility shall be required to undergo security background investigations as a condition of employment and continued employment. For the purposes of the subsection, security background investigations shall include, but not be limited to, employment history checks, fingerprinting for all purposes and checks in this subsection, statewide criminal and juvenile records checks through the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, and federal criminal records checks through the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and may include local criminal records checks through local law enforcement agencies.
(1) Any person who is required to undergo such a security background investigation and who refuses to cooperate in such investigation or refuses to submit fingerprints shall be disqualified for employment in such position or, if employed, shall be dismissed.
(2) Such background investigations shall be conducted at the expense of the employing agency or employee. When fingerprinting is required, the fingerprints of the employee or applicant for employment shall be taken by the employing agency or by an authorized law enforcement officer and submitted to the Department of Law Enforcement for processing and forwarding, when requested by the employing agency, to the United States Department of Justice for processing. The employing agency shall reimburse the Department of Law Enforcement for any costs incurred by it in the processing of the fingerprints.

## 29. Drug Court Projects

## 30. Overtime for Law Enforcement Personnel

e. In the event a federal or state court or federal or state administrative agency makes a finding of discrimination after a due process hearing on the grounds of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, or disability against a recipient of funds, the recipient will forward a copy of the finding to FDLE and to the Office for Civil Rights, Office of Justice Programs.
f. In accordance with federal civil rights laws, the subgrant recipient shall not retaliate against individuals for taking action or participating in action to secure rights protected by these laws.

k. Any discrimination complaints filed with FDLE will be reviewed by FDLE's Inspector General and referred to the Office for Civil Rights, the Florida Commission on Human Relations, or the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, based on the nature of the complaint.

In so doing, the subgrant

To avoid duplicating existing networks or IT systems in any initiatives funded by the Bureau of Justice Assistance for law enforcement information sharing systems which involve interstate connectivity between jurisdictions, such systems shall employ, to the extent possible, existing networks as the communication backbone to achieve interstate connectivity, unless the subgrant recipient can demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Bureau of Justice Assistance that this requirement would not be cost effective or would impair the functionality of an existing or proposed IT system.

## 53. Supplanting

The subgrant recipient agrees that funds received under this award will not be used to supplant state or local funds, but will be used to increase the amounts of such funds that would, in the absence of federal funds, be made available for law enforcement activities.
54. Conflict of Interest

The subgrant recipient and implementing agency will establish safeguards to prohibit employees from using their positions for a purpose that constitutes or presents the appearance of personal or organizational conflict of interest, or personal gain.
55. Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisitions Act

The subgrant recipient will comply with the requirements of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisitions Act of 1970 ( 42 U.S.C. $§ 4601$ et seq.), which govern the treatment of persons displaced as a result of federal and federally-assisted programs.

## 56. Limitations on Government Employees Financed by Federal Assistance

The subgrant recipient will comply with requirements of 5 U.S.C. §§ 1501-08 and $\S \S 7324-28$, which limit certain political activities of State or local government employees whose principal employment is in connection with an activity financed in whole or in part by federal assistance.

64. Text Messaging While Driving

Pursuant to Executive Order 13513, "Federal Leadership on Reducing Text Messaging While Driving," 74 Fed. Reg. 51225 (October 1, 2009), and $\$ 316.305$, F.S., the subgrant recipient is encouraged to adopt and enforce policies banning employees from text messaging while driving any vehicle during the course of performing work funded by this subgrant and to establish workplace safety policies and conduct education, awareness, and other outreach to decrease crashes caused by distracted drivers.
65. System for Award Management (SAM)

The subgrant recipient must maintain current information in SAM until it submits the final financial report required under this award or receives the final payment, whichever is later. ## 66. Maximum Allowable Salary

## 73. Other Federal Funds

## 74. Monitoring

The recipient agrees to comply with FDLE's grant monitoring guidelines, protocols, and procedures, and to cooperate with FDLE on all grant monitoring requests, including requests related to desk reviews, enhanced programmatic desk reviews, and/or site visits. The recipient agrees to provide FDLE all documentation necessary to complete monitoring of the award. Further, the recipient agrees to abide by reasonable deadlines set by FDLE for providing requested documents. Failure to cooperate with FDLE grant monitoring activities may result in sanctions affecting the recipient's award, including, but not limited to: withholding and/or other restrictions on the recipient's access to funds referral to the Office of the Inspector General for audit review, designation of the recipient as a FDLE High Risk grantee, or termination of an award(s).

## 75. Unmanned Aerial Vehicles

The recipient agrees that awarded funds may not be expended on unmanned aircraft, unmanned aircraft systems, or aerial vehicles (US, UAS, or UAV) unless the BJA Director certifies that extraordinary and exigent circumstances exist, making them essential to the maintenance of public safety and good order. Additionally, any funding approved for this purpose would be subject to additional reporting, which would be stipulated by FDLE post award.
