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2018 City of Fort Lauderdale Special Survey Executive Summary

Purpose and Methodology

ETC Institute administered a specialized neighbor survey to residents of the City of Fort Lauderdale during the fall of 2018. The purpose of the survey was to gather information in three areas that have traditionally received lower levels of satisfaction on the annual neighbor survey: traffic flow, homelessness, and public education. The City will be using the information to guide and further discussions and collaborative efforts with partner agencies, including the State of Florida, Broward County, Broward County Public Schools, and many others.

The seven-page survey, cover letter, and postage paid return envelope were mailed to a random sample of households in Fort Lauderdale. The cover letter explained the purpose of the survey and encouraged residents to either return their survey by mail or complete the survey online. At the end of the online survey, residents were asked to enter their home address, this was done to ensure that only responses from residents who were part of the random sample were included in the final survey database.

Ten days after the surveys were mailed, ETC Institute sent emails and placed phone calls to the households that received the survey to encourage participation. The emails contained a link to the online version of the survey to make it easy for residents to complete the survey. To prevent people who were not residents of Fort Lauderdale from participating, everyone who completed the survey online was required to enter their home address prior to submitting the survey. ETC Institute then matched the addresses that were entered online with the addresses that were originally selected for the random sample. If the address from a survey completed online did not match one of the addresses selected for the sample, the online survey was not counted.

The goal was to obtain completed surveys from at least 600 residents. The goal was exceeded with a total of 838 residents completing the survey. The overall results for the sample of 838 households have a precision of at least \pm 3.38% at the 95% level of confidence.


The percentage of "don't know" responses has been excluded from many of the graphs shown in this report to facilitate valid comparisons. When the "don't know" responses have been excluded, the text of this report will indicate that the responses have been excluded with the phrase "who had an opinion." The percentage of "don't know" responses has been included in the tabular data in Section 3 of this report.



In order to better understand how the results vary around the City, ETC Institute geocoded the home address of responses to the survey. The map to the right shows the physical distribution of respondents to the survey based on the location of their home.

Traffic Flow

Contributors to Traffic Congestion

Sixty-seven percent (67%) of the residents surveyed, who had an opinion, thought poorly timed traffic signals contributed "very much" or "much" to the traffic congestion in Fort Lauderdale; 21% thought poorly timed traffic lights contributed "some" to the traffic congestion, and 13% thought they contributed "very little" or "none." Other items that residents, who had an opinion, thought contributed "very much" or "much" to traffic congestion in Fort Lauderdale included: distracted drivers (64%), new development (55%), and street construction/maintenance (55%).

Based on the sum of the respondents' top choices, residents thought the biggest contributors to traffic congestion in the City were 1) poorly timed traffic signals (42%), new development (27%), and distracted drivers (24%).

Ease of Travel by Car in Fort Lauderdale – <u>WEEKDAYS</u>

Twenty percent (20%) of the residents surveyed, who had an opinion, thought it was "very easy" or "easy" to travel by car during the weekdays on US1/Federal Highway from Oakland Park Boulevard to Commercial Boulevard. Other weekday travel by car that residents felt was "very easy" or "easy" included: Cypress Creek Boulevard from I-95 West to NW 31st Avenue (15%), Davie Boulevard from



SW 4th Avenue to US1/Federal Highway (15%), and Andrews Avenue from New River to NE 4th Street (14%).

Residents, who had an opinion, thought the most difficult road segment to travel by car during the weekday was Broward Boulevard from I-95 to US1/Federal Highway (74% "difficult" or "very difficult").

Ease of Travel by Car in Fort Lauderdale – WEEKENDS

Twenty-seven percent (27%) of residents surveyed, who had an opinion, thought it was "very easy" or "easy" to travel by car during the weekend is on Broward Boulevard from I-95 to US1/Federal Highway. Other weekend travel by car that residents felt was "very easy" or "easy" included: Andrews Avenue from New River to NE 4th Street (25%), Cypress Creek Boulevard from I-95 West to NW 31st Avenue 15%), and US1/Federal Highway from Oakland Park Boulevard to Commercial Boulevard (24%).

Residents, who had an opinion, thought the most difficult road segment to travel by car during the weekend is Sunrise Boulevard from Searstown to Gateway (61% "difficult" or "very difficult").

Roadway Segments That Should be Top Priorities for Improvement

Based on the sum of respondents' top two choices, the roadway segments residents' thought should be top priorities for improvement, with regard to weekday travel by car, were: Broward Boulevard from I-95 to US1/Federal Highway (40%), Sunrise Boulevard from I-95 to Andrews Avenue (23%), and Sunrise Boulevard from Searstown to Gateway (21%).

With regard to weekend travel by car, the roadway segments residents' thought should be top priorities for improvement were: Sunrise Boulevard from Searstown to Gateway (20%), Broward Boulevard from I-95 to US1/Federal Highway (20%), and Las Olas Boulevard from Andrews Avenue to SE 15th Avenue (19%).

City Intersections That Should be Top Priorities for Improvement

Based on the sum of the respondents' top two choices, the intersections in Fort Lauderdale that residents' thought should be the top priorities for improvement were: Sunrise Boulevard and US1/Federal Highway (at Gateway), Sunrise Boulevard and US1/Federal Highway (at Searstown), and Broward Boulevard and Andrews Avenue.

Areas the City Should Prioritize to Improve Traffic Flow

Based on the sum of the respondents' top two choices, residents who had an opinion thought improving traffic signal synchronization (60%) and implementing roadway improvement/complete street projects (48%) should be areas the City should prioritize in the next year in order to improve traffic flow.





Homelessness

How Often Homelessness is Observed in Fort Lauderdale

Eighty-four percent (84%) of the residents surveyed, who had an opinion, indicated they have observed homeless people in downtown Fort Lauderdale almost daily; 9% of them a few times per week, 4% have observed them a few times per month, 2% have observed them a few times per year, and 1% have observed them seldom or never. Other areas of Fort Lauderdale where residents have observed homelessness almost daily include: parks (65%), other areas (58%), commercial areas (53%), beaches (53%), and their neighborhood (53%).

Support for the City Taking Various Actions to Address Homelessness

More than three-fourths (78%) of residents, who had an opinion, were "very supportive" or "supportive" of the City increasing enforcement of existing ordinances which prohibit panhandling in the City; 13% were "somewhat supportive," 6% were "not supportive," and 4% were "not at all supportive" of this action. Other ways that residents support the City addressing homelessness include: providing grants to non-profit organizations who provided services to the homeless in the City (74% "very supportive" or "supportive"), using an existing facility in the City as a day center/transitional facility with homeless support services (71% "very supportive" or "supportive"), and banning overnight sleeping in public areas without a permit (70% "very supportive" or "supportive").

The actions residents supported least to address homelessness was designating land for public camping (53% "not supportive" or "not at all supportive").

Two Actions Residents Are Most Supportive of the City Pursuing

Based on the sum of the respondents' top two choices, the actions residents would be most supportive of the City pursuing to address homelessness were: increasing enforcement of City ordinances which prohibit panhandling in the City (36%), developing new and/or expanding existing homeless shelters in the City (34%), and banning overnight sleeping in public areas without a permit (30%).

Biggest Concerns Associated with Homelessness in the City

More than three-fourths (76%) of the residents surveyed indicated panhandling/begging was the top concern associated with homelessness in Fort Lauderdale. Other concerns include: making neighbors feel uncomfortable in public places (71%), negative impact on tourism (56%), and negative impact on business (47%).

Based on the sum of the respondents' top two choices, the residents' concerns associated with homelessness in the City were: panhandling/begging (54%), making neighbors feel uncomfortable in public places (44%), and crime (28%).



What the City Should Spend on Homelessness

More than one-third (39%) of residents think the City should spend more on homelessness, 28% think the City should spend about the same, 12% think less, and 22% don't know. Of the thirty-nine percent (39%) of respondents' who thought the City should spend more, the preferred methods of increasing funding for homelessness initiatives in the City were: raising City taxes (34%), reducing funding for other City services (15%), and other methods (27%). The remaining twenty-five percent (25%) responded with "don't know.


Organizations That Should Have the Most Responsibility for Addressing Homelessness

Thirty-one percent (31%) of the residents surveyed, who had an opinion, thought the City of Fort Lauderdale should have the most responsibility for addressing the issue of homelessness in the City. Other organizations that residents thought should have the most responsibility include: Broward County (23%), the State of Florida (15%), the Federal Government (13%), non-profit/religious organizations (6%), and other organizations (2%).

Public Education

Quality of Public Schools in Fort Lauderdale

Thirty-nine percent (39%) of residents surveyed, who had an opinion, indicated the ratings of elementary schools in Fort Lauderdale (grades K-5) were "excellent" or "good;" 24% thought the quality of high schools (grades 9-12) were "excellent" or "good;" and 22% thought the quality of middle schools (grades 6-8) were "excellent" or "good." The quality rating for Fort Lauderdale schools (elementary, middle, and high schools) have increased 3% or more since 2017.





Top Priorities for Improvement in Fort Lauderdale Public Schools

Based on the sum of the respondents' top two choices, the priorities for improvement in the Fort Lauderdale elementary schools (grades K-5) were: children are safe from bullying at public schools in the City (18%), public schools in the City have high quality teachers (17%), and the teacher to student ratio is good at public schools in Fort Lauderdale (12%).

Based on the sum of the respondents' top two choices, the priorities for improvement in the Fort Lauderdale middle schools (grades 6-8) were: children are safe from bullying at public schools in the City (19%), public schools in the City have high quality teachers (15%), and public schools in the City offer high quality academic curriculum choices (12%).

Based on the sum of the respondents' top two choices, the priorities for improvement in the Fort Lauderdale high schools (grades 9-12) were: children are safe from bullying at public schools in the City (16%), public schools in the City have high quality teachers (13%), and crime is not a problem at public schools in the City (12%).

How the Quality of Public Schools in Fort Lauderdale Has Changed

Twenty-seven percent (27%) of residents surveyed, who had an opinion, thought the quality of high schools in Fort Lauderdale had improved compared to five years ago; 35% thought the quality had stayed the same, and 39% felt it had decreased. Twenty-five percent (25%) of residents surveyed, who had an opinion, thought the quality of the City's elementary schools had improved compared to five years ago; 43% thought the quality had stayed the same, and 32% felt the quality had decreased. Twenty-four percent (24%) of residents surveyed, who had an opinion, thought the quality of middle schools in Fort Lauderdale had improved compared to five years ago; 39% felt the quality had stayed the same, and 37% felt that the quality had decreased.



Trend Analysis

The most notable increases and decreases from 2017 to 2018 are provided in the tables below. Changes of more than +/- 3% are considered noteworthy.

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

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
Q1. Contributors to Traffic Congestion. Please indicate how much you think each of the following contributes to traffic congestion in Fort Lauderdale.




Q2. Which TWO of the contributors listed in Question 1 do you think are the biggest contributors to congestion in Fort Lauderdale?









Q3b. If you work outside the home, how do you primarily travel to work?





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Q3c. If you work outside the home, what is the average amount of time it currently takes you to commute home?





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Q4. Do you regularly use a traffic app or car navigation system to identify the fastest route to your destination?










Q5. Which THREE of the following options might help you choose to make more trips by means other than your car?

by percentage of respondents (sum of respondents' two choices)





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Q7b. Which TWO roadway segments listed in Question 6b (WEEKEND) do you think should be the top priorities for improvement in Fort Lauderdale?



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Q8. Intersection Improvements. Which TWO of the following intersections in Fort Lauderdale do you think should be the top priorities for improvement?









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Q10. Which of the following organizations do you think are primarily responsible for traffic signals and traffic signage (such as stop signs) in the City of Fort Lauderdale?










Q13. Please indicate how often you observe homeless people in the following areas of Fort Lauderdale.

- 1. 17th street bridge opens too often, boats should be required to post their height from their waterline.
- 2. 3 lanes traveling west old mcnab and nw 31st st 31st stop has 3 lanes right turn n.b forward through lite to sw 15th and left turn, going south...the center lane should be able to go north or south as well so long as the lane is clear. If you look at lane lay out you can see it would make the flow of traffic move, plus citizens would be more easy to drive as not to cut others off, just to get over..."just a thought"
- 3. 36 bus from oakland to sunrise galleria
- 4. A moratorium on building new projects. Better enforcement of existing traffic laws.
- 5. Above road street car like miami or seattle. Make downtown one way (3rd and andrews)
- 6. Add more roundabouts where possible.
- 7. Add poles to entrance to i-95 on sunrise blvd (heading west) to prevent vehicles from cutting into turning lane for i-95 at the last minute.

In addition there are back ups—for cars turning left at us 1 to go south because the turn lane narrows then widens again plus cars coming from 7th avenue. Needs major refiguration and limiting cars crossing lanes.

- 29. Cell phone usage while driving is too dangerous with the amount of drivers on the heavily congested roadways. Being a 18 year resident i've seen drastic change in traffic and having been almost hit due to other drivers being on phones this is the a huge traffic culprit
- 30. Change frequency of drawbridge openings on all east-west roads during morning and afternoon rush hours.
- 31. Change parking patterns on los olas and wilton dr, add garage parking.
- 32. Change your allotments so that projects start earlier in the year.
- 33. City of fort lauderdale to take over from department of transportation. They clearly don't know what they are doing or don't care.



- 34. Close las olas from us 1 to the bridge east by that sushi restaurant.
- 35. Combination of all, more public transit options, more turn lanes, better signal timing, more safety considerations.
- 36. Commercial blvd e should have a left turn lane at ne 24th terrace. N dixie hwy at 5100 traffic should be able to make a left turn coming out of shopping area. People who live north of there have to go to dixie and around.

- 177. Much of those answers are varied because of the time of day.
- 178. My husband and i do not drive a car in fort lauderdale, so we use buses and uber, thus not your typical resident, but it would be admirable to have more light rail and buses to eliminate fossil-fuel automobiles.

- 204. Police enforcement of distracted drivers and red light runners and drivers failing to signal and stop.
- 205. Police presence happens after people are downtown. 6th street between 20 ave and 7 ave needs early morning police presence.

One example is middle river park, which is near low-income housing, and its pavilion attracts loiterers which isn't a nice park experience. I've seen patrolling officers stop and talk to them, so they are aware of the issue it seems.
