





































Three Core Focus Areas:

Sustainability and Blight Remediation projects:

Four major service days

(80 + projects)

- a. Fort Lauderdale Cares Day April: 300 450 volunteers complete 25 -35 HOA driven projects. They do urban farming, paint homes, read to children, landscape neighborhood entrances, beautify parks, clean beaches and neighborhoods.
- **b. Fort Lauderdale Ready Day** June: 100 -150 Volunteers from 12 15 HOAs engage their neighbors in hurricane preparedness conversations and distribute 200 hurricane preparedness starter kits.
- c. *Fort Lauderdale Makes a Difference Day October: 350 500 volunteers complete dozens of service projects. They paint homes, landscape neighborhood entrances, beautify parks, clean beaches, parks, and neighborhoods.
- **d. Fort Lauderdale United Day** January: 300 400 volunteers from local organizations come together in one neighborhood to remove litter, build and paint Little Free Libraries, give away trees, read to local children, etc.
- Fort Lauderdale Beach Sweep every second and fourth Saturday. Thousands of volunteers remove tons of trash and untold cigarette butts annually.
- Paddle With A Purpose Every month several dozen volunteers clean waterways and shorelines collecting 250 - 400 pounds of debris.
- *Adopt-A-Neighbor Painted 24 homes of deserving, disadvantaged neighbors.
- Initiated the Food Forest at Snyder Park to educate children in sustainable practices. CAM #21-0250

2. Early Literacy and Youth Empowerment Projects:

- *Fort Lauderdale Little Free Libraries Since 2016, the Action For Literacy team build, decorated and installed 127 Little Free Libraries throughout the city of Fort Lauderdale.
- Every year the Action For Literacy team gives away over 35,000 books at community events and through the library network.
- Coordinated a dozen library decorating events.
- Held quarterly Read-A-Thons at YMCA.
- *Show Up, Step Up, Stand Up Youth Leadership Program Over three years, 26 high school students completed service projects that taught accountability and built self-esteem.
- Collaborated with the ReadingPals and Take Stock in Children programs to place 50+ volunteers.

3. Community Engagement and Empowerment projects:

- Held six Find Your Passion Within workshops.
- Piloted the Club 55+ concept.
- Set up the Riverwalk Ambassador program.
- Art13 25 local artists decorated prize winning Little Free Libraries.
- **MSD Memorial** 100's of volunteers celebrated the 17 lives lost in the school shooting tragedy.
- *Open Canvas Project autumn 2017 80+ renown local artist and 400 + volunteers transformed the blighted former city building into an exciting and visually impactful urban art piece.

COVID19 and Homeless initiatives

- Since April 17, 2020 co-managed 52 Mills Pond Food Distributions serving 41,000 + meals.
- Created the * Fort Lauderdale Cares Project
 - Delivered over 1,000 personalized comfort packages to homebound elderly, veterans, and disadvantaged families.
 - Held eight monthly Pop-Up Resource Event to benefit 75+ families and 180+ children enrolled in Fort Lauderdale elementary schools who experience homelessness.
 - Raised over \$7,000 in cash and \$50,000 in material donations.
 - Engaged over 200 volunteers in food distributions and deliveries.
 - * Selected as a Finalist for NUSA's 2021 Best Neighborhood Program Award

- The 39-person strong volunteer leadership team has been spearheading a variety of projects and supporting all Neighbor Volunteer Office activities.
- Twelve team members completed the Defensive Driving to operate city vehicles.
- They raised tens of thousands of dollars in cash and material donations as well as untold hours for volunteer time.
- Created three independent 501.3.c. Non-Profits to support their missions
 - Action For Literacy LLC.
 - Beach Sweep America Inc.
 - Paddle With A Purpose Inc.















ACTION FOR LITERACY EVERY CHILD READS

- President: Mark Miller
 Vice-President: Ray Dettmann
- 501 (c) (3) Non-Profit formed in 2017.
- Created "Childhood Literacy" programs targeted to improve neighborhood literacy levels.
- Build, installed and filled over 120 "Little Free Libraries" throughout the City of Fort Lauderdale and participated in numerous community events.
- Over 500 volunteers participated in various programs.
- Distributed 35,000 + Free Books annually .
- Raised \$25,000 + to support the Little Free Library program.













- President: Barry Levy Vice-President: Stephen Einhorn
- 501 (c)(3) Non-Profit formed in 2016.
- Every second and fourth Saturday of the month between 100 275 beach lovers congregate at the HUB, 300 South Fort Lauderdale Beach.
- An average of **1,900 volunteers** participate every year to collect over **150,000** cigarette butts and more than **2,000 pounds of garbage, plastics and recyclables.**
- Their small amount of donated time made a huge environmental, recreational, and economic difference.
- Kids Ecology Inc. provides educational programs for children.
- Publisher and Eco Artist Susie Q Wood turns collected trash into Art.
- There are an additional 35-50 smaller group beach cleanups organized each year.

Paddle With A Purpose

Waterway and Shoreline Cleanup

- President: Robert Figueroa Team Leader: Zachary Oppenheim
- 501 (c)(3) Non-Profit formed in 2019
- Every third Saturday of the month between 15 and 25 "Paddle With A Purpose" volunteers take out kayaks, sponsored by a local outfitter at George English or Delevoe Park.
- In a little over two years the team collected over 17,000 pounds of trash from City of Fort Lauderdale waterways.
- They typically collect anything from bottles, cigarette butts, tires, bike and car tires, strollers, fire extinguishers to the kitchen sink.
- Paddle with a Purpose is working not only to remove trash but to educate the community about littering, promoting cleaner waterways, and preservation of our quality of life.
- The organization has expanded to Key West, Orlando, and Tampa.

Collective Impact:

By the numbers since 2013:

- Over 25,000 individuals answered the call to service. (2019: 4,000+)
- Volunteer contributions averaged 9,800 hours each year and peaked in FY 2019 at 17,733 hours
- Estimated value to the City is \$2,135,000 (2019: \$482,500)
- Goodwill created in the community PRICELESS



Collective Impact:

As accomplishments:

- Built strong working relationships with a large network of local educational institutions, businesses, civic and non- profit organizations, churches etc.
- Volunteers and community leaders have taken leadership roles in almost all service projects.
- The collaborative efforts produced six National Award-Winning Projects and garnered over 20 local and national recognitions.
- The ability to engage neighbors to lead a large number of volunteer activities increases the social capital to enhance the image of the City, its leadership, and our neighbors.
- The low cost, high impact community service activities have created a high level of goodwill in the community.

Opportunities:

 Harness the strong foundations of the community network to exponentially enhance education and community service within the City.
