EDWARD D. STONE JR. FORT LAUDERDALE COMMUNITY LEADER

Fort Lauderdale's quest in the 1980's to become "The Best City of its Size" by 1994 required such commitment from many individuals who took the clay that was our early city and molded it into the extraordinary one we know today. One very important individual at the forefront of envisioning that greatness for Fort Lauderdale was landscape architect Edward D. Stone, Jr.

Ed Stone Jr. was the first-born son of the renowned architect Edward Durell Stone. Raised and educated in the northeast, Ed received a degree in Architecture from Yale, after which he served as a fighter pilot in the U.S. Air Force, where he was able to see the world and revel in the "natural beauty of the land." This experience fed a desire to pursue a Master's degree in Landscape Architecture from Harvard University. Ed's desire to move to Florida and his passion for landscape architecture would serve to fuel his entire life. In 1959, Stone moved to Fort Lauderdale and began his career working with Fred Stresau, one of the pioneers of landscape architecture in the State of Florida. The next year, he founded Edward D. Stone, Jr. and Associates (EDSA), at first working out of his garage.

Realizing that commercial work would be more impactful than residential, he began to collaborate with his father's firm and over time, became well-known both domestically and internationally. Under Ed's leadership, EDSA greatly impacted tourism, community-living and urban design in the United States, especially in Florida, as well as in the Caribbean and Europe. Since 1960, the firm has received over 300 statewide, national and international awards.

Ed was elected a Fellow in the American Society of Landscape Architects (ASLA) and in 1994 was awarded the Society's prestigious ASLA Medal, the "highest honor the American Society of Landscape Architects may bestow upon a landscape architect whose lifetime achievements and contributions to the profession have had a unique and lasting impact on the welfare of the public and the environment."

Stone also served three consecutive four-year terms on the U.S. Commission of Fine Arts, appointed by Presidents Nixon, Ford, and Carter. He served as a consultant to the Committee for a More Beautiful Capital in Washington, D.C., and to the Governor's Conference on Environmental Quality in the State of Florida. He was an active member of the Urban Land Institute and was honored to serve numerous other professional and civic organizations.

Under Ed's influence and leadership, EDSA has partnered with the City of Fort Lauderdale for more than three decades on several significant public realm projects that have helped to redefine the city as a world class destination. Most notably, Ed was a passionate advocate and design leader of the Riverwalk and Beach Revitalization projects, both of which were key to Fort Lauderdale's renaissance in the 1990's. These public design initiatives have resulted in over \$1 billion of private sector investment, stimulated numerous redevelopment projects, and improved public access and use of Fort Lauderdale's most prominent assets for both residents and visitors.

After nearly 60 years, the firm that Ed Stone founded in his Fort Lauderdale garage remains committed to his ideals, delivering world class projects that greatly enhance quality of life. Ed was drawn to such opportunities to shape the public environment and improve quality of life, noting: "We want to harness the resources of the earth and marry them to the needs of people". Most recently, the Las Olas Boulevard Corridor Improvement project has carried on Ed's vision of employing great design as a means to create high quality public space that is accessible to all.

For those who knew him, there is only one word that can be used to describe Ed Stone: gentleman. In a competitive world, very few can persist in maintaining the qualities of honesty, frankness and respect for others. Ed personified these qualities and no one who had the pleasure of meeting Ed could ever forget him...he was a true treasure whose legacy should be memorialized in Fort Lauderdale, the adopted city to which he committed his life and work.
