TITLE: Resolution Authorizing the City Manager to Execute a Grant Agreement

with Sea Turtle Conservancy to Fund the Installation of External Light

Shields Along State Road A1A - \$16,670 - (Commission District 2)

Recommendation

Staff recommends the City Commission authorize the City Manager to execute a grant agreement, in substantially the form attached, with the Sea Turtle Conservancy (STC) in the amount of \$16,670 to fund the installation of external light shields along State Road A1A from Alhambra Street north to Sunrise Boulevard and bring existing pedestrian light fixtures into compliance with current Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission (FWC) lighting design standards for light fixtures that can impact sea turtle nesting habitats.

Background

The existing pedestrian light poles on the east side of State Road (SR) A1A do not have an external light shield from the entrance of the South Beach Parking Lot north to Sunrise Boulevard. City Staff has developed a good working relationship with FWC, and they requested installation of the light shields. The purpose of the light shield is to shield point source of light for sea turtles, especially during the sea turtle nesting period.

The existing pedestrian light poles on the east side of SR A1A from the South Beach Park entrance north to Sunrise Boulevard were installed in 2011 without an external cutoff shield. The 2011 fixtures have amber lights and are illuminated 12 months of the year. The light fixtures were approved by FWC in 2011. The pedestrian light poles north of Sunrise Boulevard were installed in 2015 and they have an external cutoff shield. The 2015 fixtures also have amber lights and are illuminated 12 months of the year. The external cutoff shield is the current FWC requirement for light fixtures that can impact sea turtle nesting habitats. Exhibit 3 contains photos of existing shielded and non-shielded light fixtures along SR A1A and a detail of the 2015 light fixture showing the light shield. The proposed light shield is a 270-degree shield with the opening facing west towards the sidewalk and away from the beach.

The STC grant will fund 100% of the costs to furnish and install external light shields on existing pedestrian lights poles from Alhambra Street north to Sunrise Boulevard. A separate City project will retrofit the pedestrian light shields from Alhambra Street to the South Beach Park entrance. Approval of the grant will provide funding to bring existing pedestrian light fixtures into compliance with current FWC lighting design standards for light fixtures that can impact sea turtle nesting habitats.

Resource Impact

This action will result in a positive fiscal impact to the City in the amount of \$16,670 for the grant acceptance which will be appropriated to the account below contingent upon the approval of the Consolidated Budget Amendment CAM 21-0925.
